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Foreword

As we collectively march forward in our fight against climate change, every year seems to be marked by an alarming event—or several—that opens our eyes even wider and brings the stakes for our planet into greater relief.

This year it arrived for New Yorkers on June 7, when smoke from wildfires in Canada many hundreds of miles away turned our sky apocalyptic orange and made our air toxic. On that day, New York City had the worst air quality of any city in the world and more than 75 million people on the East Coast—including all across New York—were under air quality warnings.

Beyond our region, we've seen the deadliest wildfires in United States history ravage Hawaii, melting ice sheets are quickening the pace of sea level rise, all while the earth is experiencing its hottest year on record.

We don't need these reminders to advocate for a shift from a fossil fuel burning society to one that relies on renewable energy to power our economy and our lives. But there is no doubt that these climate events serve as a societal wake-up call that we are facing an environmental emergency.

This is why holding our elected leaders accountable is more important than ever, and it's why the New York League of Conservation Voters (NYLCV) is once again proud to offer its annual New York State Environmental Scorecard. In these pages you will not only find highlights of the environmental legislation passed during the 2023 legislative session, you will see how each member of the State Senate and Assembly voted on these measures and whether they are doing enough to address the climate crisis.

As we look back, we are pleased that several NYLCV priorities passed in 2023, including bills that will:

- Ban the use of unnecessary and harmful pesticides used by some New York farms, helping to ensure New York’s food security, agriculture, and environment, by protecting these pollinators and the crops they help produce.
- Make it easier for all New Yorkers to find out if they have a lead service line carrying their drinking water into their home.
- Grant class “C” waterways—which support fisheries and are key to protecting communities against flooding—the same protections as other streams.
- Require the state to develop a highway and depot electric vehicle charging action plan.
- Require the New York State Energy and Research Development Authority (NYSERDA) to establish a plan for improved transmission planning and coordinating systems for offshore wind energy.
- Update regulations so that geothermal heating and cooling systems will be more affordable and more easily available to New Yorkers.
- Require the disclosure of insurance information on permit applications for the construction of pipelines upon any freshwater wetlands.

Unfortunately, Governor Hochul has already vetoed several of these bills, though she still has time to sign others. While the 2023 legislative session took steps forward as New York continues to lead on climate action, the urgency of the climate crisis demands that lawmakers go even further next year.

In many ways, however, the Senate met the moment. They passed a Clean Fuel Standard and the NY HEAT Act—which combined would be a monumental stride towards reducing greenhouse gas emissions in the transportation and buildings sectors. They passed

measures to expand EV charging infrastructure, as well as the Just Energy Transition Act which would ensure we can simultaneously address environmental concerns and environmental justice. We also applauded the senate for passing a bill to address the safety of e-bike batteries.

The Assembly must now follow their lead and get these measures over the finish line next year.

In closing, we hope New Yorkers will use this Scorecard as a yardstick for measuring the actions their representatives took—or didn’t take—on the environment, and by doing so we hope this Scorecard will continue to impact the actions of our legislators.

New York State Budget Victories

Although we do not assign it a score, some of this year's most significant environmental wins were achieved by way of the state budget, which included important action on the fight against climate change. The budget included a commitment to zero-emission buildings, renewable energy and, critically, a cap-and-invest measure to pay for the state's transition to a clean energy economy. A dedicated funding stream with a focus on affordability and labor standards is a prerequisite to meeting the nation-leading goals set out in the Climate Leadership and Community Protection Act (CLCPA). Without it, the state won't be able to afford the projects that will deliver on renewable energy, clean transportation, and more. We look forward to engaging with state agencies as they develop this program.

OTHER MEASURES IN THE BUDGET THAT NYLCV SUPPORTED INCLUDE:

- The All-Electric Buildings Act, which is a significant step towards decarbonizing our buildings sector; \$30 million to replace two fossil-fueled chiller plants at the University at Albany with a thermal energy system and a requirement to issue decarbonization action plans for 15 of the highest-emitting state facilities;
- Utility bill relief and funding for transition and workforce training programs, which will help protect low- and middle-income ratepayers and workers as we accelerate our move away from fossil fuels;
- \$500 million for the Clean Water Infrastructure Act;
- \$400 million for the Environmental Protection Fund, without raiding the fund to pay for agency staff;
- Increased funding for MTA operating aid; and
- The Suffolk County Water Quality Restoration Act to help the local government address the acute water quality issue in the county.

We applaud Governor Hochul, Majority Leader Stewart-Cousins, Speaker Heastie, Senate Environment Conservation Committee Chair Peter Harckham and Assembly Environmental Conservation Committee Chair Deborah Glick for including these important policies in this year's budget.

About the Bills



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Transportation

CLEAN FUEL STANDARD

A. 964/S. 1292

A clean or low-carbon fuel standard would require transportation fuel providers to reduce their emissions by at least 20% by 2031 and incentivize fleets and fuel providers to move away from carbon-intensive fuels like diesel and gasoline toward low- or zero-carbon fuels like electric, biofuels, and hydrogen. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Carrie Woerner and Senator Kevin Parker, A. 964/S. 1292 passed in the Senate and is in Assembly Environmental Conservation.*

EV CHARGING IN PUBLIC LOTS

A. 4871/S. 1535-A

This legislation would require all New York State owned or operated parking garages, open parking lots, and other parking facilities to install and maintain a set amount

of charging stations for plug-in electric vehicles (EVs). *Sponsored by Assemblymember Anna Kelles and Senator Brad Hoylman-Sigal, A. 4871/S. 1535-A passed in the Senate and is on the Assembly Floor Calendar.*

HIGHWAY AND DEPOT CHARGING PLAN

A. 5052-C/S. 4830-C

This legislation would amend the public authorities and public service laws to require the development of a highway and depot charging action plan to meet the state's clean transportation goals. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Carrie Woerner and Senator Tim Kennedy, A. 5052-C/S.4830-C passed both houses and was vetoed by the Governor on November 17, 2023.*

COMPLETE STREETS

A. 1280/S. 2714

This legislation would amend the highway law, in relation to enabling safe access to public roads for all users by utilizing complete street design principles. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Jonathan River and Senator Tim Kennedy, A. 1280/S. 2714 passed in the Senate, and is in Assembly Transportation.*

NY WILDLIFE CROSSING ACT

A. 4243/S. 4198

This legislation would direct the department of transportation to identify sites along all highways, thruways, and parkways in the state where wildlife crossings are most needed to increase public safety and improve habitat connectivity; and to create a priority list of wildlife crossing opportunity areas where federal grant monies may be available to implement the top five projects identified. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Bobby Carroll and Senator Leroy Comrie, A. 4243/S. 4198 passed in the Senate and is on the Assembly Floor Calendar.*

Buildings

NY HEAT

A. 4592-A/S. 2016-A

This legislation would amend the public service law and the transportation corporations law, in relation to aligning utility regulation with state climate justice and emission reduction targets; to repeal section 66-b of the public service law relating to continuation of gas service; and to repeal section 66-g of the public service law relating to the

sale of indigenous natural gas for generation of electricity. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Pat Fahy and Senator Liz Krueger, A. 4592-A/S. 2016-A passed in the Senate and is in Assembly Corporations, Authorities, and Commissions.*

LEAD PIPE RIGHT TO KNOW ACT

A. 6115/S. 5512

This legislation will make information about the number and location of lead pipes easily accessible to the public and decision-makers, so that state and federal resources can be secured and efficiently disbursed to local efforts to get the lead out of New York’s drinking water by removing all lead pipes. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Amy Paulin and Senator Gustavo Rivera, A. 6115/S. 5512 passed both houses and is awaiting action from the Governor.*

GEOTHERMAL REGULATORY RELIEF

A. 6949/S.6604

This legislation would exempt certain geothermal boreholes at depths beyond five hundred feet from certain requirements. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Deborah Glick and Senator Pete Harckham, A. 6949/S. 6604 passed both houses and was signed by the Governor September 23, 2023 (chapter amendment required).*

Waste

RECHARGEABLE BATTERY RECYCLING LAW

A. 7339-B/S. 643-D

This legislation would maximize the removal of unwanted rechargeable batteries from the solid waste stream and help reduce the amount of waste being shipped to landfills. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Deborah Glick and Senator Brian Kavanagh, A. 7339-B/S. 643-D passed in the Senate and is in Assembly Rules.*

Public Health

PFAS IN MENSTRUAL CARE PRODUCTS

A. 5990-A/S. 3529-A

This legislation would prohibit the use of certain restricted substances in menstrual products, and ban the use of such restricted substances as a fragrance, colorant, dye, preservation, or other intentionally added ingredient for the presentation of products. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Linda Rosenthal and Senator Nathalia Fernandez, A. 5990-A/S. 3529-A passed in the Senate and is in Assembly Health.*

Natural Resources

PROTECTION OF CLASS C STREAMS

A. 4601-A/S. 1725-A

This legislation reclassifies class “C” waterways as streams, granting these waterways the same protections as other streams. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Deborah Glick and Senator Pete Harckham, A. 4601-A/S. 1725-A passed both houses and was vetoed by the Governor on November 17, 2023.*

COMMUNITY RIGHT TO KNOW ACT

A. 3946/S. 3365

This legislation requires the disclosure of insurance information—including the name of the insurance company, the amount of coverage and what is covered under their plan—on permit applications for the construction of pipelines upon any freshwater wetlands. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Pat Fahy and Senator Pete Harckham, A. 3946/S. 3365 passed both houses and was signed by the Governor on September 22, 2023.*

Energy

NEW OFFSHORE WIND GENERATION TARGETS

A. 7407/S. 6327-A

This Legislation would increase the state’s offshore wind electricity generation target for 2035 established by the CLCPA and establish new ambitious targets for 2040, 2045, and 2050. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Didi Barrett and Senator Brian Kavanagh, A. 7407/S. 6327-A is in Assembly Rules and Senate Finance.*

JUST ENERGY TRANSITION ACT

A. 4866-C/S. 2935-C

This legislation would direct NYSEERDA to develop a study of competitive options for phasing out and redeveloping New York State’s most-polluting fossil fuel facilities by 2030 while still ensuring resource adequacy and grid reliability. It would further direct the Department of Public Service (DPS) and the Department of Environmental Conservation (DEC) to develop initiatives to advance the recommendations made by this study. *Sponsored by Assemblymember Anna Kelles and Senator Kevin Parker, A. 4866-C/S. 2935-C passed in the Senate and is in Assembly Energy.*

Methodology & Key Results

Bills that passed their respective houses of the legislature were graded on whether or not each legislator took the pro-environment vote. An unexcused missed vote is counted the same as an anti-environmental vote, though we did not count excused absences against the final score. Scored bills that did not reach a floor vote were graded on co-sponsorship. Members were given a grace period until November 7 to co-sponsor bills. Annual scores are based on a scale of 0 to 100 and calculated by dividing the number of pro-environmental votes or bill sponsorships by the total number of bills each member was scored on. This year, we are grading 14 bills in each chamber. Legislative leaders were not graded, although the scores of their conferences, which they have a substantial impact on, are listed.


